Speaker Bios

Constantine Chatzipapathodoridis is an M.A. graduate of the Department of American Literature, School of English, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. His fields of research include LGBT studies, performance studies, popular culture and southern studies. His M.A. thesis focused on the aesthetics of camp parallel to the Southern Gothic subgenre. So far, he has presented his works twice in international conferences and has managed to publish his first research paper. He is an ambassador of The Greek Canadian History Project. A Ph.D. is what he is hoping to pursue next.

Aikaterini Delikonstantinidou is a Ph.D. Candidate in the School of English at the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. She is assistant editor of the academic journal *Gramma/Γράμμα: Journal of Theory and Criticism* and of the online journal *Critical Stages: The IACT webjournal*. Her research interests include Ethnic Studies (with a focus on the Greek American paradigm), Performing Arts, Ancient Drama, as well as Mythology, Folklore, and Ritual Studies. She is an ambassador of The Greek Canadian History Project.

Christina Galliou is in her third year of her undergraduate studies in School of English, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. Last semester she worked on a project named "20th century America" for her American Literature class that focused on various topics such as immigration and identity. She has participated in various Model United Nations events with emphasis on issues pertaining to immigration, diaspora, and identity. In addition she was the representative of the Greek Delegation in the EU Immigration committee for the 64th International European Youth Parliament in Frankfurt. She has also been a volunteer for AIESEC A.U.Th., a no-government and no-profit organization, which has offered her the opportunity to get in touch with people from many countries via the coordination of various internships allowing her to widen her knowledge with regard to multiculturalism and identity. She is an ambassador of the Greek Canadian History Project.

Sakis Gekas is Hellenic Heritage Foundation Chair of Modern Greek History at York University, Toronto. He works on British colonialism in the Mediterranean and the history of the Ionian State and offers courses on the history of Modern Greece, the history of Greek migration and Diaspora and the history of Empires and Colonialism in the Modern Mediterranean. He is co-director of the Greek Canadian History Project, an initiative to create an archive at York for the history of Greek immigrants to Canada. Sakis is now completing a book on the Ionian State and is spending his sabbatical year at the National Research Foundation in Athens, working on an economic history of Greece during the long nineteenth century.

Christina Gkountona is an M.A. student in School of Philosophy and Education, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. History of Philosophy is her field of interest with particular emphasis placed on epistemology. Her M.A. thesis focuses on the topic of "Aristotelian views about Memory: A Critical Approach from the Scope of Experimental Psychology and Neuroscience." She is an ambassador of The Greek Canadian History Project.

Christopher Grafos is a Ph.D. Candidate in the Department of History, York University. He is currently working on his dissertation that examines Greek homeland politics in Toronto and Montreal from 1967 - 1974. He is also a Co-Founder and Co-Director of the Greek Canadian History Project (Clara Thomas Archives & Special Collections, York University), which is an initiative designed to acquire, preserve, digitize, democratize, and disseminate historical materials and knowledge concerning the experience of Greek immigrants in Canada and their descendants. Currently, he is the holder of the Hellenic Heritage Foundation Fellowship in Modern Greek History and serves as Graduate Representative on the Executive Board of the Modern Greek Studies Association.

Penny Koutsi is currently an M.A. student in the department of American Literature and Culture at Aristotle University. The theme of her dissertation is novels' adaptation on stage and the visualization of violence. Her academic interests include theater studies, postmodern fiction and ethnic identity. She has taken part in various conferences and written articles for ECHOES and MIT's online magazine. She is an ambassador of The Greek Canadian History Project.

Kali Petropoulos holds a M.A. in History from McMaster University and a Specialized Honors B.A. in History from York University. Her M.A. thesis titled, "Sixties Permissiveness: six inches short of a feminist," explored the mini-skirt as a Cultural Revolution, but argued that it was not a vehicle for liberation and permissiveness for feminists during the 1960s in Britain. After her M.A., she completed a post-Graduate diploma in Corporate Communications and Public Relations at Seneca College. Kali currently works at York International at York University as the Summer Study Abroad Assistant, where she coordinates York U summer abroad courses and other special summer school programs. She is also the Public Relations Coordinator for the Greek Canadian History Project (GCHP), managing the online platform for the project which includes the GCHP blog and Facebook Page.

Anastasia Stefanidou completed her Ph.D. entitled "Ethnic and Diaspora Poets of Greek America" at the Department of American Literature and Culture, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, Greece. She has taught courses on 19th and 20th century American literature, prose and poetry, at the same department. She is currently teaching a graduate course on Research Methodology. Stefanidou was awarded a Salzburg Seminar Fellowship and a Princeton University Library Fellowship. She has recently been awarded a Library Research Fellowship from the Tsakopoulos Hellenic Collection, California State University, to conduct research on the memoirs of second-generation Greek Americans. She has presented her work at conferences in Greece and abroad and has published articles on Jeffrey Eugenides, prominent Greek American poets such as Nicholas Samaras and Andonis Decavalles, an essay comparing the work of Meena Alexander and Miranda Cambanis, and book reviews for the European Association of American Studies and *The National Herald*. Her scholarly work on Greek American literature has appeared in such journals as the *Journal of the Hellenic Diaspora*, *The Charioteer*, the *Journal of Modern Hellenism*, and *The Greenwood Encyclopedia of Multiethnic American Literature*. She is currently working on the stories of Theano Papazoglou Margaris and the novels of Elia Kazan.

George Stremplis is currently in the second year of his M.A. Studies in Ethical Philosophy and Bioethics in Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. He is keen on philosophy hence his B.A. and M.A. studies in that field. He is also interested in interdisciplinary approaches to history, literature and the arts. He is an ambassador of The Greek Canadian History Project. His next step is to pursue a Ph.D.

Fotini Tavlaridou is in the fourth year of her B.A. studies in School of German Literature and Culture of Aristotle University of Thessaloniki.
