Seminar Speakers and Talks

1. Introduction to Academic Practices for Research Visibility (by Dr. Giorgos Dimitriadis)

The seminar is addressed to MA students of the School of English and PhD candidates at the beginning of their dissertation that wish to familiarize themselves with the basic academic practices for improving the visibility of their research. The following components are included:

- (a) types of academic publications and conference participation; differences and benefits
- (b) the basics of presenting a paper in a conference
- (c) academic networking and indirect publicity
- (d) predatory journals; how they work and how to avoid them

2. A short guide to surviving the bumpy ride of publishing: From journal articles to monographs (by Dr. Aikaterini Delikonstantinidou)

This seminar addresses emerging scholars who would like to see their research published in the form of journal articles, chapters in collective volumes, or even in the form of a monograph. Given that the way to academic publishing can make for a bumpy ride, it is useful to break down the entire process—conceived in broad terms for reasons of accessibility—to its key components and few manageable steps. Our hope is that this can serve as a short practical guide of sorts that will make your scholarly publishing endeavors more rewarding and less overwhelming—and perhaps more fun too.
